

Nuclear Law

- Does not clearly authorize source security regulation.
 - ITE Mission (OLA)
 - Nuclear Security Legal Handbook, vol. I and II.
 - Model Legal Framework for the Use of Radiation Sources and for the Management of the Associated Radioactive Waste.

Existing Regulations

- Do not define or compel appropriate physical protection requirements.
 - Review of Current Regulations and Comment on draft Regulations, upon request.
 - IAEA Model Regulations (pending).
 - Revised IAEA Guidance (NSS #11 vs. TecDoc 1355).



Categorization Scheme

- Does not exist or does not organize sources based upon potential risk.
 - RS-G 1.9 (Categorization of Sources).
 - Code of Conduct.
 - Nuclear Security Series no. 11 "Security of Radioactive Sources"

Registry of Sources

- Incomplete and/or information management system is inadequate.
 - RAIS (numerous other tools).
 - Verified Inventory Program (NSRW).



National Threat Definition

- Is not being used, if one exists.
 - Design Basis Threat Workshop (NSNS).
 - National Threat Assessment.
 - Based upon analysis of Risk and Potential Consequence.



Security Principles and Risk

- Regulatory and operator staff unfamiliar with security principles and potential risk.
 - Training Courses (NSNS)
 - Deterrence
 - Detection and Assessment
 - Delay
 - Response
 - Security Management

Enforcement Authority and Coordination

- National Law does not provide adequate enforcement authority to regulatory body or enforcement is too complicated.
 - OLA
- Coordination with other governmental bodies, such as Customs, Transport Ministry, Police, etc is <u>necessary</u>.



Requesting Assistance
